Did you know? Norfolk County is a "single-tier" municipality that provides all municipal services. Many other municipalities are dual-tier, with "upper" and "lower" governments offering different services.

Get to know our government

The responsibilities of federal, provincial, and municipal governments in Ontario are defined by the Constitution Act of 1867. Here's a breakdown of their roles:



Federal Government (Canada)

Main focus: National and international affairs

Responsibilities include:

- Airports and air travel
- Criminal law (Criminal Code)
- Currency and banking
- Defence (Canadian Armed Forces)
- Employment Insurance (EI)
- Fisheries and oceans
- Foreign affairs and international trade
- Immigration and citizenship
- Indigenous affairs
- Postal service
- Telecommunications and internet regulation



Provincial Government (Ontario)

Main focus: Regional issues and services

Responsibilities include:

- Colleges and universities
- Education (K-12)
- Healthcare (hospitals, OHIP)
- Labour laws (minimum wage, workplace safety)
- Liquor and cannabis regulation
- Natural resources and the environment
- Property and civil rights
- Provincial courts and civil law
- Social services (social assistance, disability support, policy, regulations, funding)
- Transportation (provincial highways)



Municipal Government (Norfolk County)

Main focus: Infrastructure and local services

Responsibilities include:

- Building permits and inspections
- Garbage collection
- Libraries and community centers
- Local police and fire services
- Local roads and snow removal
- Parks and recreation
- Property taxes
- Public transit
- Social services program delivery and direct support to community members
- Water and sewage
- Zoning and land use planning



Just like a Member of Parliament (MP) can't make decisions about local zoning, a Mayor can't make decisions about education. Contacting the correct level of government will help you get the best outcome.

What government and elected officials do

Member of Parliament (MP)



Level: Federal

Elected to: House of Commons in Ottawa **Represents:** A federal riding (electoral

district) in Canada

Main role:

- Debates and votes on national laws
- Canada-wide issues like immigration, defence, foreign policy
- Often part of a political party (Liberal, Conservative, NDP, etc.)

Example: Contact your MP for immigration, income taxes, or national health funding

Member of Provincial Parliament (MPP)

Level: Provincial (Ontario)

Elected to: Legislative Assembly of Ontario

in Toronto

Represents: A provincial riding

Main role:

- Debates and passes provincial laws
- Ontario-specific issues like education, healthcare, highways, housing
- Often part of a political party (Liberal, Conservative, NDP, etc.)

Example: Contact your MPP for OHIP, public schools, provincial disability support

Mayor



Level: Municipal

Elected to: Head of a Municipal Council

Represents: The entire County

Main role:

- · Leads the County council
- Sets local priorities (e.g. housing, public safety, transit, infrastructure)
- Acts as the public face of the County
- Doesn't pass laws like MPs or MPPs, but helps create by-laws and County budgets

Example: Contact your Mayor to share feedback on municipal issues or community priorities.

Councillor



Level: Municipal

Elected to: Municipal Council (along with

the Mayor)

Represents: All residents elected by the Ward (smaller area of the County)

Main role:

- Votes on County by-laws and budgets
- Works closely with residents to resolve local concerns
- Helps shape local policies around zoning, public services, parks and safety

Example: Contact your Ward Councillor to share feedback on issues about your Ward or community priorities.



- ☐ First-aid kit
- ☐ Flashlight With extra batteries
- ☐ Radio Battery-powered or crank
- ☐ Medications 3-day supply
- ☐ Phone charger cable and a portable power bank
- ☐ Important papers ID, health cards, contact list
- ☐ Personal items Wipes, sanitizer, toilet paper, toothbrush, soap, etc.
- ☐ Comfort items Toys, books, games
- ☐ Pet supplies Food, leash, carrier
- ☐ Cash Small bills and coins
- ☐ Basic tools Multi-tool, duct tape, zip-lock bags, garbage bags, whistle
- ☐ Keys For car and house keys
- ☐ Whistle To attract attention
